• The local internet news site saw the tweet and they retweeted it to their 512 followers.

• The local radio station saw the tweet and retweeted it to their 534 followers.

So, with a little effort and no expense, news of the square dance club's activities arrived in a lot of homes. Maybe this awareness will help bring us to mind when the time comes to look for new dancers in September.

Dance Etiquette Tip Wait.... Don't Thank Your Square Yet.

Square Dancers are very good about thanking the people in their square at the end of a tip. But don't be so quick to do so. There is something else you should do first.

As the music ends, dancers should remember to clap before thanking each other.

Why? Who are they clapping for? Why the **caller**, of course.

It is only polite to acknowledge the work of the caller at the end of each tip.

Let him or her know that you appreciated the music choice and the dance moves that were created for you to have fun with.

Let the caller know that you appreciated the time he or she spent to practice singing the song and to prepare smooth flowing and interesting choreography.

You can never go wrong by taking the time to show appreciation

And **then**..... you can thank your square.

(The same can be said for showing appreciation to the round dance cuer.)

She not only danced, but became a fine caller. She will be missed by all of us.

Decorations are being made, food is being planned. Nick, Dustin and Mary Anne are rounding up some great music and practising their singing.



It's Lonely at the Top!



To Dress or Not to Dress? That is the Question

The dance season is coming to a close, but in many areas, dancers will be out and about participating in dance demonstrations at parades, fairs, etc. What should we consider when planning a demo dance?

Of course, we know that there are basically two different kinds of demonstrations. One is for the purpose of recruiting and the other is strictly for providing entertainment.

To dress or not to dress is one of the big considerations for either type of demo. If you are providing the entertainment at an event, with no consideration at all of recruiting new dancers, then by all means dress up in your finery. But, remember that you are performing as a group so you should prearrange what you will wear for clothing so that you will have a 'group' look. It will look a bit odd if only one lady wears a prairie skirt while all the others wear short skirts and crinolines. Matching outfits in club colours are sometimes appropriate too, when entertaining.

If, however, you are dancing at a farmer's market or at a fair and you hope to entice spectators to try square dancing in the future, you might want to leave your finery at home. Conventional wisdom on this matter suggests that in this situation, you want to present each dancer as just one of the public. You want the onlookers to be able to visualize themselves in a square without having to worry about finding/buying fancy clothes. Prairie skirts or regular street skirts as well as slacks would be suitable in this scenario.

It has also been suggested that dancers might like to make an effect by co-ordinating a sort of casual 'uniform' when entertaining for recruitment. That just simply means that the dancers could wear matching polo shirts, perhaps with the club logo on them. This would be a way to create the group or team feeling without intimidating those who are watching.

Oh and by the way, if you are hoping to recruit at your demo, don't show off! Keep the steps easy and smooth and provide a good variety of music.

Computer Struggles - You may have discovered that if you have computer difficulties, there is often a tech support person you can phone for assistance or advice. The examples below of some of these calls may help to explain why the tech person sounds so exasperated at times.

Tech support: What kind of computer do you have?
Customer: A white one...
Tech support: Click on the 'my computer' icon on to the left of the screen.
Customer: Your left or my left?
Mouse Pad
Tech support: What's on your monitor now, ma'am?
Customer: A teddy bear my boyfriend bought for me at the 7-11.

Do You Want to Do it On Your Own?

Have you ever wished you could get people square dancing at a family reunion, church gathering, with a school group or at a house party? Do you know of a club or group who does not have regular access to a square dance caller but wishes to try and get new people involved in square dancing?

Happily, there are some resources available for the dedicated dancer or teacher who wishes to try to introduce square dancing in spite of the absence of a caller. Here are 2 of them - both have been used by **Diane Weismiller** with the Skeena Squares in Terrace as well as others in our region.

Moving and Grooving Dance Program

The Moving and Grooving Dance Program was created by Nick & Mary Anne Turner for the BC Square & Round Dance Federation. It is available from the website at:

This program contains a 169 page instruction manual with 8 CDs. The first part of the program explores dances in formations such as circles, trios, contra lines, etc.

The second section is entirely Modern Square Dancing. There are ten sequential units, with all instructions and calling done on the CDs.

Lesson plans and terminology for this section are included in the binder but don't be scared away. They are for your information only. All of the teaching and calling is on the CDs.



Instant HoeDown

The Traveling Hoedowners are a square dance group from Florida. Their mission is to support square dancers and callers around the world to keep square dancing alive and well. They do this by producing high quality instructional DVDs and making them available for purchase from their website at

A few years ago they created Mainstream and Plus DVDs. Their newest offering is the Instant Hoedown DVD.


They say that their Instant Hoedown DVD makes it possible for anyone to have a square dance party, even if they have never square danced before! It includes 10 easy square dance lessons with dancing following each lesson for instant fun. Beginners can be dancing in 10 minutes, making it perfect for schools or a western



themed party, family reunion - no experience necessary!

Each lesson builds on the previous lessons allowing you to fill 15 minutes or an entire evening with learning and fun exercise for a wide range of age groups. The square dance calls are explained and demonstrated on two DVDs with 21 dances using the calls that are taught.

The music and calls for all 21 dances are also included on a CD so can be enjoyed wherever a CD player is available. The DVD insert lists the times for the lessons, walkthroughs, and dances to help in lesson planning for use in schools, home schooling, clubs, and other organizations. Will you be in Calgary on May 8 or 9? These dances with caller, Hunter Keller, might interest you.



Hunter had been around square dancing all of his life, having been dragged from dance to dance by his grandparents and parents. He met and became friends with many national callers with whom he is still friends today. After the death of his grandfather – his hero – in 2002, Hunter decided that he wanted to do something that would always remind him of his grandfather, and decided to start taking square dance lessons in 2004. A mere four months later he picked up a microphone and began calling.

He is now the caller for two clubs, the 59ers and, in 2008, revived his grandparent's old club, the Checkerboard Squares. Hunter called his first festival in July of 2007 in California and has also traveled to Japan, Germany and Australia to call and has been a staff caller on both land and cruise trips as well.

In 2008, Hunter was honored with a chance to become a recording artist for Royal Records.

Hunter is a ten-year 4-H alumni and a past 4-H leader. Hunter credits almost everything he has learned throughout the past 15 years to 4-H and says that, if it were not for that program, he would

This edition wraps up the 15th year of the Cariboo Connection Newsletter. Thank you to those who contributed to the 3 issues this year.


There are many more of you out there that we haven't heard from, however - especially new dancers and callers and cuers. Perhaps next season you will summon up the courage to write an article.
