Something New

There's something new in Square Dancing! It seems that now you may be able to hire a caller from anywhere in North America to call for your club, party or special dance using Skype.



For those of you who are not acquainted with Skype, it is a computer program that allows you to talk with someone and at the same time be able to see each other as you converse.

Already the first successful dance has been called using this technology. The dance was held in Wausau Wisconsin, while the caller, Andy Alememao, was in Southern California. A 46 inch screen hanging on the wall let the dancers hear the calls and see the caller and the caller could see the front 4 squares as he called.

The club that hosted this dance is in an area that has very few callers available to them and they are trying this Skype method as a way to get a variety of talented callers for their dancers to enjoy. They plan to host a Skype dance twice a month.

Michael Streby, a caller from Wisconsin, reported that there was no time delay with the sound and that the dancers really enjoyed the trial run. His comment was that "Andy was literally bigger than life on the 46 inch screen." He did mention that this system would probably work for all of Canada and the USA but may not work if the sound was being bounced from a satellite from overseas. Time will tell, I guess, as clubs experiment with this new approach.

Callers, there's a great way to listen to Square Dance music with most of the producers on one website called Music For Callers: <u>http://www.musicforcallers.com</u>

You can listen to song clips and order songs which will come as an MP3 download and some of the producers have a few CDs available. MP3s are same day download using PayPal. Dancers, you can even buy a song you really like for your caller!

Unfortunately, with the current \$US/CDN exchange rate, one song is about the same cost as buying a head and a half of cauliflower.

Something Old

It looks like vinyl 45 RPM square dance records are a thing of the past. Recently over 200,000 were consigned to the recycle bin after a buyout of a major Square Dance music distributor.

The records were deemed too heavy to ship, too many to store. Callers, hang on to those old records! Some of those songs may never appear as newly recorded MP3s and new callers will be wanting some of this stuff to convert to digital format when you hang up the microphone.

A Bit of Nostalgia

Some great old calls have disappeared from most callers' repertoire. Who remembers.....

Box the Flea, Red Hot, Divide, Throw in the Clutch (put 'er in low) Catch All Eight, Rip 'n Snort, Dixie Chain Grand Spin?

Grand Spin was the feature of the singing call The Grand Colonel Spin to the tune of Colonel Bogey.

Talking of "Grand", Burleson's Square Dancers' Encyclopedia lists 150 calls that start with "Grand ______. How many have you danced?

My 1992 edition of the encyclopedia listed 4998 calls and you can bet many more have been added in the years following 1992!



A BC Square and Round Dance Provincial Festival is Heading Your Way! July 2017

It has been quite a few years since a full provincial square and round dance festival has occurred for our dancing pleasure. Happily, a dedicated group from the lower mainland has stepped up to organize one for July 6, 7, 8, **2017**. It will be held in Cloverdale and requires a minimum pre-registration of 417 dancers in order for the festival to receive the final go-ahead. Organizing committees have been formed and Registration Forms are now available on the website at **BCFestival2017.squaredance.bc.ca**

While it may seem very early to register, **Wendy Krueger**, a Co-chair for the festival has sent us this message to pass on to you.

Nairobi is very security conscious and most places are gated with 24/7 security and cars are searched and people have to go through a scan and belongings are checked. There are few places where you can walk safely. The traffic and air pollution in Nairobi is very bad.

The Kenyan people are very friendly. I enjoyed my stay in their country and I was sad to leave.

Karen & family have now moved back to the UK where they have bought a place in the south of England.

Twila has offered a special rate to square dancers of \$89.00 per night for single or double occupancy + tax . I would advise that square dancers register as early as possible since I don't know how long they will hold the block of rooms for us.

Round Dance News

The BC Square and Round Dance Federation sponsors a "Round of the Month" program.

Three times a year, participating Regions select a Round Dance that they really like and designate it as the Round of the Month for B.C.

Throughout the province, participating round dance leaders assist their dancers to the learn and dance the chosen dance.
